
#### REFLECTIONS FROM THE HEART

"Blessed is the one who trusts in the LORD, whose hope is the LORD." Trust is such a big thing to ask. It is a privilege, sacred, a blessed grace. Trust in human terms is such a huge responsibility. To ask a person too blindly or too simply trust you simply because you say to. What a tall order to ask an individual. Not to worry about or be concerned about what you will possibly say or do without really knowing the outcome or how you will or might commit us to do something or live with something that might be unethical, immoral, a lie or illegal because you simply ask us to put our trust in you. To have faith in that all will be okay, taken care of, satisfactorily resolved without cheating, stealing or hurting another but by simply trusting and not questioning you when you say "trust me, all will be okay." That is such a big thing to ask of a person. Not because you cannot be trusted but because our trust has been shattered and broken so often. So many times by people who told us to trust them. Quite honestly, I shudder and shake at the thought of trusting a person at face value and doing so with such blind faith and without further inquiry. Trust because you say so. I tremble at the words, "just trust me." Honestly, they do not settle well with me. Seriously, I cannot even trust myself, tempted so often with poor judgements, lies and untruths, so many misconceptions, terrible bad memories, mistrust at so many levels and broken promises that so many individuals never intended to keep. When trust is shattered in a million pieces, healing seems an impossibility. God must bring restoration and slow healing. We need the Lord, our Divine Physician and tender surgeon, to perform reconstructive surgery to our hearts to heal our faith and trust once again. Healing is ever so slow. It requires a bridge of healing to construct and build what took one moment or incident to destroy but what will feel like so many centuries before one can begin to heal and trust again. I trust in Jesus. I trust in God. I trust in Mary. As a family, I have never been let down. Actually, they can always be trusted because they have never lied and have always kept their promises. God says do not be afraid, have faith, believe, hope in the Lord. He is trustworthy and can be trusted with the truth, always.



#### St. Jerome Emiliani, Priest – February 8th

St. Jerome Emiliani (1481-1537) who was from Venice, Italy, chose a military career and lived a rather careless and carefree life. He was captured in battle and cruelly imprisoned in chains. During that time he learned to pray, and resolved to reform his life. After escaping he went to Treviso and became mayor of that town, but soon returned to Venice and sought ordination to the priesthood. That goal he achieved in 1518, when he was 37 years old.

Outbreaks of the plague were endemic in northern Italy during the late 15th, and the 16th centuries, and like many religious individuals, Jerome began to care for the sick and the poor. He took a particular interest in orphaned children, eventually founding a religious institute to do this work and to educate the young abandoned youth. St. Jerome Emiliani, "father and friend of orphans," (Collect of his mass) died as a result of illness contracted while caring for the sick and the poor.

The Church, in the tradition of the ancient prophets, has always been dedicated to the poor and the needy in the manner of St. Jerome Emiliani. In that tradition the Church continues to urge us to be conscious of this mission:

"You hear rising up more pressing than ever, from their personal distress and collective misery, "the cry of the poor." Was it not in order to respond to their appeal as God's privileged ones that Christ came, even going as far as to identify himself with them?" (Evangelica Testificatio, n. 17).

This is an exhortation addressed to religious but is significant for all. The point of reference is the Pastoral Constitution on the Church in the Modern World, nos. 63ff, which deals with economic and social life.


The World Synod of Bishops in 1971 also stated in "Justice in the World," that "we must be prepared to take on new functions and new duties in every sector of world society, if justice is really to be put into practice...." Our action is to be on behalf most especially of the "silent, indeed voiceless, victims of injustice."

Our dedication to the poor after the manner of the saints is demanding and to give ourselves to it St. Jerome Emiliani tells us "to place our trust in God and in no one else. God does not work in those who refuse to place all their confidence and hope in Him alone. But he does impart the fullness of his love upon those who possess a deep faith and hope; for them he does great things. If then you remain constant in faith in the face of trials, the Lord will give you peace and rest for a time in this world, and forever in the next." (From a letter to his brothers)



# Did you know that Plenary Indulgences are available during this Jubilee Year? What is an indulgence?

Even though confessed and forgiven sins will not send a person to hell, consequences remain to be paid on earth or in purgatory. An indulgence frees the recipient from those consequences. Reception of an indulgence always springs from sincere repentance, the desire to live a holy life, reception of the sacraments of Penance and Holy Communion as soon as possible and prayer for the Holy Father. An indulgence cannot be bought, nor can one be obtained by going through the motions without sincerity.

A partial indulgence covers part of the punishment due for sins; a plenary indulgence removes all of it. Both kinds of indulgence come from the merits of Jesus, the Blessed Mother and the saints. These "merits" are the opposite of "demerits." They are spiritual fruits accumulated through holy living. To grant indulgences, the Church draws on a great treasury of merits: the infinite value of Christ's Passion, death and Resurrection, and the prayers and good works of the Blessed Virgin Mary and the saints – including all of those on earth who live holy lives.

This year, the faithful, 'pilgrims of hope', will be able to obtain the indulgence by undertaking a pilgrimage to any sacred Jubilee site, to at least one of the four Major Papal Basilicas of Rome, to the Holy Land or to other designated ecclesiastical sites, and taking part in a moment of prayer, a liturgical celebration or celebrating the sacrament of reconciliation. The indulgence can also be obtained by 'devoutly visiting any Jubilee site' and taking part in Eucharistic adoration or meditation, concluding with the Our Father, the Profession of Faith, and appropriate invocations to Mary.

Another way to obtain indulgence will be through 'works of mercy and penance', with which a person's conversion is manifested. The faithful 'following the example and mandate of Christ', are encouraged to carry out works of charity or mercy more frequently, mainly in the service of those brothers and sisters who are burdened by various needs. Likewise, they may obtain the indulgence by visiting those 'who are in need or difficulty (the sick, prisoners, the lonely elderly, the disabled...), 'in a sense making a pilgrimage to Christ present in them.'

The 'penitential spirit', notes the Norms, is 'the soul of the Jubilee' and therefore the indulgence can also be obtained by 'abstaining, in a spirit of penance, at least for one day of the week from futile distractions (real but also virtual distractions), from superfluous consumption as well as by donating a proportionate sum of money to the poor; by supporting works of a religious or social nature, especially in support of the defense and protection of life in all its phases.'
